HISTORY OF THE MARTIAL COTTLE FAMILY RANCH

Established by Edward Cottle in 1864 and continually maintained and farmed by his descendants until 2014, this land remained in agricultural production under one family for 150 years. Martial Cottle Park now celebrates our shared agricultural heritage and how the tradition of farming and sharing food continues to shape our landscape, people and history.

POTENTIAL PROJECTS

HEDGEROWS

Hedgerows are plantings of native vegetation adjacent to farm fields. They add an important element to the farm's ecosystem by providing habitat for beneficial insects and native birds. This increases biodiversity and attracts pollinators as well as predators that eat pest insects.

LARGE-SCALE FARMER CUTOUTS

These yet-to-be-designed, large-scale signs of farmers, tractors or other agricultural imagery could grace the fields at Martial Cottle Park, greeting drivers and depicting the organic farm here today or hinting at the storied agricultural past of the ranch.

YOUTH PROGRAM FUND

Martial Cottle Park's school program for 2nd and 3rd graders is gaining in popularity. Additional funds for program fees for low-income schools or program materials could help more students participate and learn about life on the ranch.

MURAL

A mural along the park trail under Hwy 85 would provide a welcome park entrance and could tell the story of Martial Cottle Park's past, present and future. It could also be a great community-building project.

ELECTRIC VEHICLE SHUTTLE

A new electric vehicle would be used to shuttle people around Martial Cottle Park's festival grounds during special events.

VISION

FOMCP supports and adopts the Park Vision of the Martial Cottle State Park General Plan and County Park Master Plan of 2014 as the Vision for our organization: The establishment of the Park will not only protect a rich piece of Santa Clara Valley's history and 287.54 acres of fertile farmland in perpetuity, but it will enhance the soil and land to provide a unique agricultural, recreational, and educational resource. The main uses of the Park will include agricultural production, habitat enhancement, recreational facilities and trails, and educational and interpretive programming related to the Park's cultural and natural resources. The Park will provide a range of educational and recreational opportunities that will be accessible to all users.
